Sermon Notes on Churched: We Fellowship (1 John 1:1-7 & other references)

- One of the words that gets thrown around a lot in church life is the word "fellowship". It can mean different things to different people depending upon what its used to describe (can reference a building like a Fellowship Hall or church potlucks and refreshments or just socializing when the church gathers)
- The word "*fellowship*: is defined by a notorious Greek word *koinonia* which means to share something in common. It's a communion, a sharing, a common bond or partnership. It also focuses on the outcome of what is shared in common, like a contribution (Rom. 15:26; 2 Cor. 8:4).
- 1 John 1:1-7 provides a helpful overview of fellowship and highlights its two directions: the vertical with God (v. 3b) and the horizontal with other disciples (v. 3a, 7)
- 1. Check your vertical partnership (1 John 1:1-6)
- Before we can properly understand and experience our fellowship with one another, we must first check our fellowship with God
 - Are you partnered with the real "Life"? (v. 1-3) Jesus is the "Word of Life"
 - Jesus is a real historical life (v. 1a: "what was from the beginning...") In the face of some growing heresies that viewed Jesus as divine, but without a real body along with others believing His divine side only connected with His humans side between His baptism and the cross, John wanted the church to know that Jesus was a real historical Person
 - Jesus gave a real experienced life (v. 1b, 2a, 3a: "heard...seen...beheld...our hands handled"). Jesus was real, not mystical or spiritual.
 - Jesus is a real proclaimed life (v. 2-3a: "and bear witness and proclaim to you the eternal life...")
 - Jesus is a real shared life (v. 3b: "and indeed our fellowship is with the Father and with His Son Jesus Christ our Lord"). 1 Cor. 1:9; 6:17 This partnership is real and matters (1 Jn. 5:10-12)
- Are you walking "in the light"? (v. 3, 5-7)): Yes, our fellowship with God is our connection to our fellowship with each other and "darkness" (wrong beliefs & behavior) can mess up that fellowship. We can't deny our sins (v. 8, 10), but confess it to experience His cleansing (v. 9)

- 2. **Cultivate your horizontal partnership** (1 John 1:7 and other selected Scriptures)
- We have fellowship with one another if we are walking in the light (v. 7)
- God uses one Greek word to describe our reciprocal relationship (allelon) written as two English words: "one another". This word is used 100 times in the New Testament and gives us about 38 ways to apply our fellowship to one another. There are 9 negative and 30 positive ways to exercise your partnership in Christ and one of them is used 15 times ("love one another").
- Let's examine the A, B, C's of our horizontal reciprocal relationship:

Accept your common partnership with other disciples in Christ (Rom. 12:5; 1 Cor. 12:25). Positionally, this is who we are because of our fellowship with God.

<u>B</u>less others with attitudes that honor your partnership in Christ (1 Pet. 5:5; Rom. 12:10b; Phil 2:3). A mind-set of humility and viewing others as more important will make fellowship work well.

Constrain yourself from damaging your common partnership with others

- The don't list: John 6:43; Rom. 13:8; 14:13; Gal. 5:15, 26; Col. 3:9; 1 Thess. 5:15a; James 4:11; 5:9
- The unity builder list: Mark 9:50; Rom. 12:6; 15:5, 7; Eph. 4:32; Col 3:13; 1
 Thess. 5:15; James 5:16

Demonstrate God's love toward your fellow partners in Christ ("love one another": Jn. 13:34-35; 15:12, 17; Ro. 13:8; 1 Th. 3:12; 4:9; 2 Th. 1:3; 1 Pe 1:22; 4:8; 1 Jn. 3:11, 23; 4:7, 11; 2 Jn 5)

- Love is an attitude and action that willfully gives itself consistently and sacrificially for the highest good of another.
- It takes the initiative ("Greet one another with a kiss of love"-1 Pt. 5:4)
- It's worth getting provoked to do ("let us consider how to stimulate one another to love and good deeds" – Heb. 10:24)
- It's a debt we should always owe others (Romans 13:8)
- It's something we should be willing to stretch to the limit of its capacity and "from the heart" (1 Pt. 1:22: "fervently love one another")
- It serves the needs of others (Gal. 5:13)
- It values others like family (Rom. 12:10: "be devoted to one another in brother love")
